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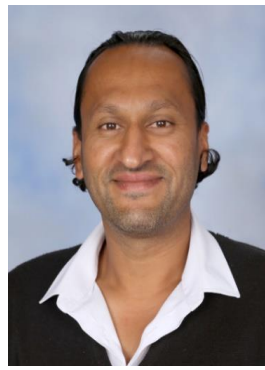

PARENT INVOLVEMENT

PARENTS AND CITIZENS ASSOCIATION- BATHURST HIGH CAMPUS

The Bathurst High Campus has an established P & C Association that meets regularly on the 1st Wednesday of every month from 7:00pm, with all parents, carers and citizens invited to attend.

The P&C liaises with the school, administers several scholarships, provides representatives on teacher merit selection panels, supports programs within the school and provides a forum for parents and carers to meet and discuss school-based programs.

PARENT FOCUS GROUP- KELSO HIGH CAMPUS

The Kelso High Campus holds two Parent Focus Group meetings per term (Week 5 and Week 10), which all parents and carers are encouraged to attend.

This group meets to discuss what is happening within our school with valuable information on the school plan and discussion on areas for improvement. The group also provides an opportunity for parents and carers to meet in an informal setting, encouraging them to build connections with other members of the group.

CAMPUS STUDENT INFORMATION

Aboriginal Education Officers and Aboriginal Education Coordinators at each campus work collaboratively with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students, parents and the community on wellbeing, academic and cultural programs.

Boys' Adviser at each campus deals specifically with issues relating to male students. Male students can seek the advice or help of the Boys' Adviser at any time.

Careers Adviser at each campus assists all students with career advice. They also co-ordinate work experience programs, university admission applications and TAFE courses for senior students.

First Aid Officer at each campus will contact parents/carer in an emergency. Please ensure that all contact details are up to date. Students will be sent home if they are sick or unwell. If students have an accident at school, campus staff will contact parents. An ambulance will always be called if the school is seriously concerned about the health and/or wellbeing of a student.

Girls' Adviser at each campus deals specifically with issues relating to female students. Female students can seek the advice or help of the Girls' Adviser at any time.

Learning Support Team (LST) at each campus ensures that students' needs are being met. They facilitate collaborative planning for student success between teachers, support staff, parents and students. The LST assists students who need additional support with referrals to outside agencies, counselling and co-ordination of school-based personnel and services.



Medication is not to be brought to school at either campus. Panadol is issued ONLY if parents or carers provide verbal permission on the day, or written permission which is kept on the student's file. Please contact the office of the relevant campus regarding the storage and administration of other daily medication.

Roll Call is held at the start of each day, at each campus. In Roll Call, there are attendance, uniform and wellbeing checks. Student notices are also read ensuring critical information is distributed to students about school activities and extra-curricular opportunities.

School Counsellors at each campus are available for students, staff and parents to visit if they are concerned about their own wellbeing or the wellbeing of others. Students can seek the advice or assistance of the counsellor at any time. Parents and staff are advised to make an appointment to see the counsellor as they have limited flexibility to add to their schedule at short notice.

SLSOs (School Learning Support Officers) at each campus work with teachers to provide additional learning support for students in class.

Year Advisers at each campus care for students holistically, focusing on their academic engagement, wellbeing and personal growth. Year Advisers work with a single year group ensuring that they develop close connections with students. This also provides parents with a specific point of contact, if they wish to discuss the progress of their child.

CAMPUS CONTRIBUTIONS

Every student uses the facilities of the campus in many different ways, and in order to maximise the opportunities we can offer each student, the campus sets a school contribution. Contributions should be paid in total by Week 4 Term 1. Alternatively, contributions can be paid in installments each term.

Assistance is available to families unable to make payment for school contributions, uniform, textbooks, school excursions or student stationery. Please contact the campus Principal or Deputy Principal for information about this service.

Each campus has specific subjects which students may choose to enrol in (e.g. electives) which require funds to cover the cost of consumables used in class. CURRICULUM

Denison College offers a wide and varied curriculum to all students at each campus which caters to the abilities, needs and interests of the student body. In Years 7 and 8, all students study a core curriculum, and in Years 9 and 10, students study a core curriculum, plus three elective subjects from a broad range of choices offered at both campuses. In Years 11 and 12, students can choose their subjects from over 60 courses offered at their home campus, across shared college lines or TAFE. Denison College facilitates inter-campus learning (shared college lines) for students by providing a bus that enables students to move between campuses for classes.

SELECTIVE ACADEMIC CLASS- iXtend Program

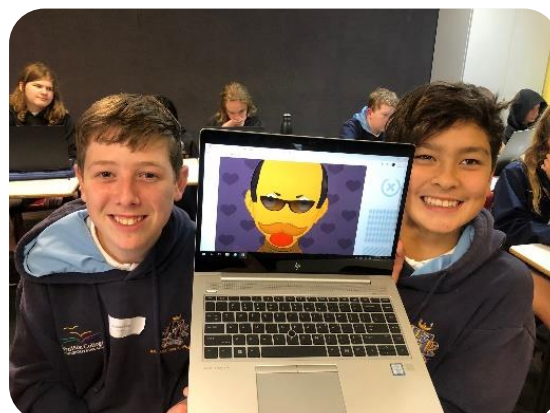
The iXtend program is offered across both college campuses for students in Years 7 and 8. iXtend is an opportunity for our high potential and gifted students to engage in a differentiated curriculum designed to extend their academic knowledge and challenge them to become creative and critical thinkers.

Throughout the year, iXtend students will also have the opportunity to work with their peers across campuses to access mentoring and participate in a range of regional and statewide external academic enrichment competitions.

Entry into the Year 7 iXtend class is based on an application process that requires an expression of interest to be completed online. Information from the student's primary school will be sought to support student placement. Students will also be required to complete a writing task when they attend their first day of transition.

Parents will be contacted directly where specific information regarding their student is needed to complete the application process in such a manner as to not disadvantage them.

TECHNOLOGY

Both campuses of Denison College are technology rich schools, with designated computer rooms, class sets of mobile laptops for student use in each faculty, smart boards, data projectors and video conferencing equipment. Additionally, each school has fully networked wireless internet access.

Bring Your Own Device (BYOD)

BYOD, or Bring Your Own Device is the policy of allowing students to bring personally owned devices (e.g. laptops or tablets) to school and to use those devices to access school information and appropriate applications for learning.

BYOD aims to improve students' learning experiences in and out of the classroom. BYOD devices will function on the College's secure wireless network, allowing students to enrich their learning experiences with relevant, familiar technology, software and applications of personal choice.

To have effective BYOD management within the College, it is necessary that all BYOD devices conform to minimum specifications. This enables all students, regardless of their device, to be able to work collaboratively in a class situation.

Please note, students may choose to bring their own device to school, however having a personal device at school is not compulsory. If you wish to access a student loan laptop, please speak with the front office staff at the relevant campus.

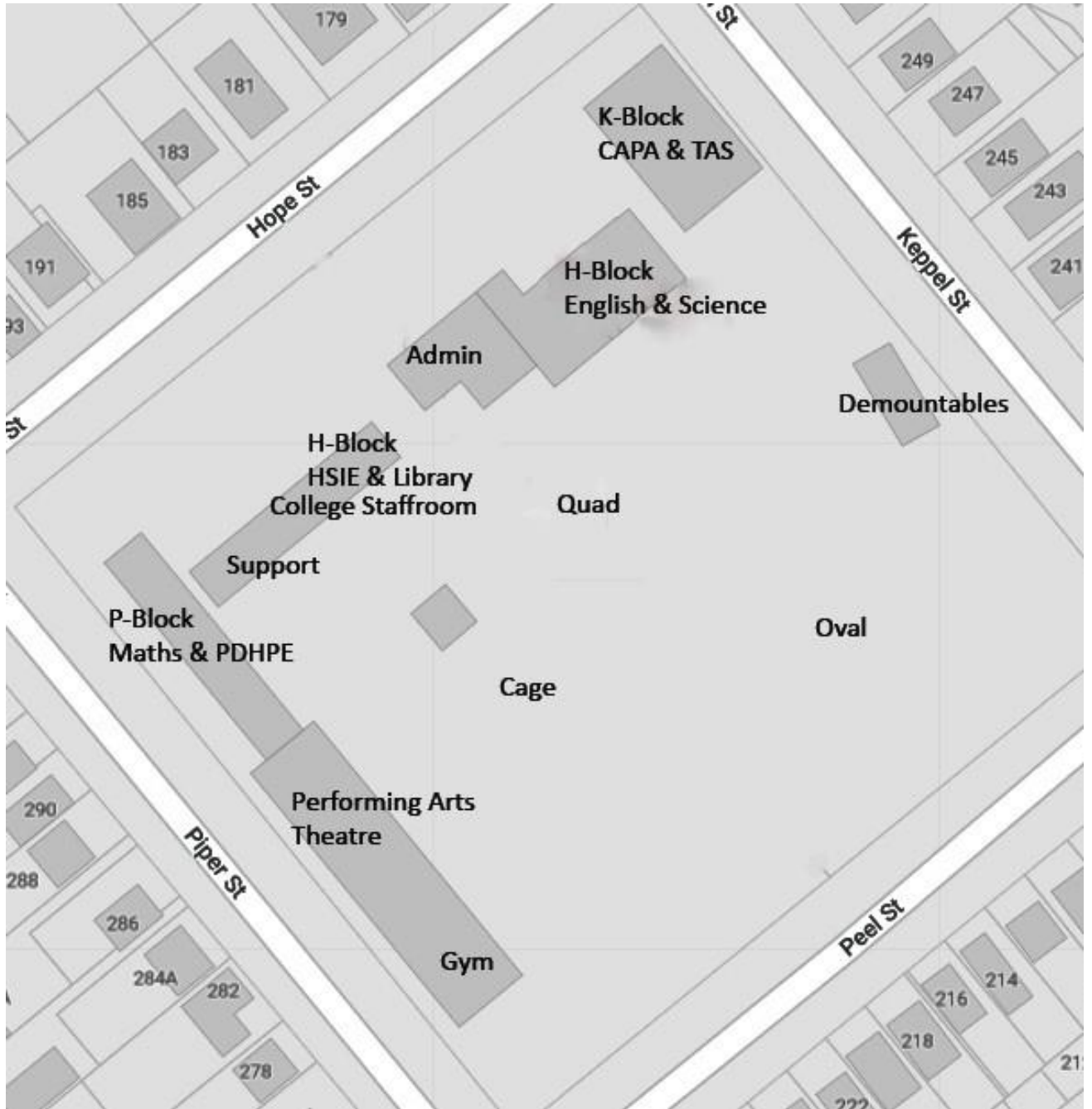

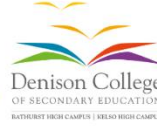
