Business Arising

- BYOD: School Fees Invoices are being posted and will include the cost of the interactive maths text book for years 7-10. The text book's interactivity includes links to tutorials to assist in learning, generating and marking practice papers. Students with poor internet coverage can download onto sticks at school for use at home. Student Assistance facility is available. Equity continues to be considered and 70 Infinity One devices have been purchased, which will through an application system be available to students for 12 month hire. These devices will be handed in over the holiday periods for updating. Several suggestions were discussed including the interactive maths texts being purchased as part of the Year 7 book packs, opportunities for computers to be donated for use in a loan pool, availability of Portable Insurance as part of contents insurance to cover BYOD Devices, Hiring through Harvey Norman, and Infinity One policy of damage repair/replacement. Also discussed was ways to provide better guidance to enable parents to make appropriate purchases of devices and to avoid buying unnecessary software and virus protection products. A parent has recently contacted the Local Member to register concerns that poor internet coverage is directly disadvantaging student learning. This issue will also be raised at the Secondary Principals conference. The BYOD head teacher has been re titled Application Team and the professional training will ensure all teachers are confident and proficient using Google classroom and OneNote to facilitate student learning. TLSO is on site on Tuesdays and the value of small computer lockers is being investigated.
- School Construction Works: TAS demountable refurbishments are currently on hold. Tenders have just closed for work which will be carried out during the holidays . This will include placement of rails so they are on both sides of the stairs. The PBL program will further reinforce the need to be safe on the stairs.
- Photos on the School Organisation Chart is being created by the Millennium support people and will hopefully be available for upcoming Parent /Teacher Nights .

- One lesson observation by a senior executive which is negotiated between the teacher and senior executive member written feedback is
 required on the observation template.

Raise Program – The Youth Mentoring Foundation

Who are raise?

Raise is a registered Australian charity with Tier 1 DGR status. The Raise Foundation has improved the lives of 1,687 young Australian boys and girls by matching them with a professional mentor to meet with weekly. We have accredited 1,241 volunteers from the community with a TAFE qualification in youth mentoring. We assist young people every day to improve their relationships, advance their coping strategies, improve their confidence, identify and achieve smart goals, and renew a focus on education and employment.



Why are we needed

- Suicide is the biggest killer of young Australians, more than car accidents or cancer
- 1 in 5 adolescents are likely to experience a diagnosable depressive episode by the age of 18
- 75% of adult mental health conditions emerge by age 24 and half by age 14
- Only 13% males and 31% females aged 16-24 will seek professional help
- The age at which young people first try alcohol in Australia is 15.7
- Among Australians aged 14-24 years, the age of initiation into illicit drug use is 16.3 years
- 1 in 3 girls and 1 in 6 boys will be sexually abused before the age of 18 years
- · Australia has the fourth highest rate of teenage pregnancy in the western world

- 1. Student to see Year advisor to get Equity laptop.
- 2. Year advisor passes this to an Executive (Principal or Deputy's) in writing with the circumstances to make final decision.
- Student comes to my office and gets Laptop Charter to be signed off by Parents and Student
- 4. Student pays \$30.00 Hire charge at the office with the option to purchase unit during or at the end of the Year.
- 5. Student returns loan unit at the end of each term for clean and re image and service.
